Authorized Signer and Power of Attorney

As an account owner, you can authorize someone to handle deposits and withdrawals for your account. This can be accomplished with a formal power of attorney or an authorized signer. A Power of Attorney (POA) is granted through a formal document that is created by a lawyer and grants specific powers to an agent to act on behalf of someone. An authorized signer is for banking purposes and is appointed by the account owner and documented on a bank signature card. Both POA and authorized signer capabilities *automatically cease upon the death of the account owner*. The authorization can also cease upon the disability or incapacity of the account

owner unless the POA or authorized signer document specifically states otherwise. For more information, contact a Farmers State Bank representative or your attorney for legal advice.

Payable on Death Beneficiary

Have you considered adding a Payable on Death (POD) beneficiary to your account if you have an individual account, joint account or a sole proprietor business account? In the event of your death where no POD beneficiary is listed, no one will have access to your account and the account will be locked. However, if you list a POD beneficiary, that beneficiary, will receive the funds in your account upon your death. Be *WISE* and Update Your Account Info!

Ensure your address, phone number, and e-mail address is current. Review your account ownership and beneficiary information.

Here are some interesting facts about money we didn't know so we thought it would be fun to share some with you.

- 1. The \$10,000 bill is the HIGHEST DENOMINATION ever circulated by the Federal Government, however the largest bill ever printed was the \$100,000 bill; it was actually a Gold Certificate issued in 1934. These notes were used for transactions between Federal Reserve banks and were not circulated among the general public.
- 2. Mutilated bills can be exchanged as long as you still have more than 50% of the note. 3. The first U.S. minted coins were made in 1792 and PAPER CURRENCY was issued in 1862 to make up for the shortage of coins.
- 4. The \$1 note makes up about 45% of currency production.
- 5. A website called "WHERE'S GEORGE?" can track where a bill has been via its serial number. www.WheresGeorge.com
- 6. A stack of one dollar bills one mile high would be worth 14.5 million dollars!
- 7. The U.S. prints 37 million bills a day, or \$696 million dollars.
- 8. Our so-called "paper currency" is actually not paper but is made of cotton/linen material, with silk fibers running through it. If it were made of paper, it would fall apart if you accidentally left it in your pants pocket and sent it through your washing machine.

Southwest Soup

Ingredients:

- 1 to 1.5 lbs hamburger
- 1 can corn, undrained
- 1 can pinto beans, undrained
- 1 can black beans, undrained 1 can diced tomatoes, undrained
- 1 can rotel, undrained
- 1 lb velveeta, cubed

Brown and drain hamburger. Put all ingredients in a soup pot or crock pot and heat thoroughly. Sprinkle crushed tortilla chips on top as soup is served.

Chocolate Chip Cookie Dough Delight

Ingredients:

- 1 tube (16.5 oz) Chocolate chip cookie dough
- 1 package (3.9 oz) Chocolate Pudding mix, instant 1 package (3.9 oz) Vanilla Pudding mix, instant
- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1 carton (12 oz) whipped topping, frozen
- 3 cups 2% milk, cold
- 1 package (8oz) Cream Cheese

Nuts and/or chocolate chips (optional)

Let cookie dough stand at room temperature for 5-10 minutes to soften. Press into an ungreased 13x9 baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 14-16 minutes until golden brown. Cool on wire rack. In a large bowl, beat cream cheese and confectioners' sugar until smooth. Fold in 1 3/4 cups whipped topping. Spread over crust. In a large bowl, whisk milk and pudding mixes for 2 minutes. Spread over cream cheese layers. Top with remaining whipped topping. Sprinkle with nuts and chocolate chips if desired. Cover and refrigerate for 8 hours or overnight until firm.
