Pumpkin Dessert

1 (12oz) can evaporated milk

3 eggs

1 cup sugar

4 tsp pumpkin pie spice

1 box yellow cake mix 3/4 cup butter, melted

1 1/2 cup walnuts

Mix together pumpkin, evaporated milk, eggs, sugar, and pumpkin pie spice. Pour into greased 9x13 inch pan. Sprinkle with cake mix, drizzle with butter and top with walnuts. Cover with aluminum foil. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Uncover. Continue baking for 15 minutes or until inserted knife comes out clean.

2 cups cooked hot white rice


Cook sliced squashes in a small pot with water until tender. Drain. Sauté squash for 10 minutes in olive oil, stirring occasiona medium to medium-low h
